JOSE GUADALUPE POSADA AGUILAR

Posada was born on February 2, 1852 in Aguascalientes, México. His parents were Germán Posada and Petra Aguilar.

By age 20 he was already an accomplished lithographer after studying in Antonio Varela's Drawing School. His political illustrations for the newspaper EL JICOTE forced him and his editor Trinidad Pedroza to move to Leon, Guanajuato. He later moved to Mexico City where he came in contact with the editor Don Antonio Vanegas Arroyo.

Posada and Vanegas became a team which complemented one another, one; illustrating stories, children's games, theater, songs, news and the famous calaveras, and the other; writing and publishing them. Posada interpreted passionately and accurately the realities of the Mexican people through his prints. He gained the reputation as México's most illustrious printmaker especially after the influence he had on major artists such as Jean Charlot, José Clemente Orozco, and Diego M. Rivera. Posada died in 1913.

This exhibition commemorates the 75th anniversary of his death. This event is dedicated to our local Posada, Carlos Cortez.

CARLOS CORTEZ

Carlos Cortez was born on August 31, 1923 in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, of a Mexican father and a German mother. His first language as a child was German; which eventually was substituted by English, Greek and Spanish.

He migrated to Chicago in 1965 where he has produced most of his work. He has illustrated through woodcuts, linoleum prints, and murals, the life and struggle of Mexican people and workers in general.

Being the oldest barrio artist, Carlos has served as a role model to a couple of generations of Chicago artists. He has been involved in the labor movement with the Industrial Workers of the World organization. He has contributed with his graphics, poetry, and other writings to labor publications. Carlos considers Posada his spiritual leader and a source of inspiration. The work of Carlos Cortez is a continuation of the Posada legacy.
